
Photo Album of George and Clara Baulch

It is presumed that the captions written in this photo album were written by Clara Stone Baulch (1875-1959), wife of George Nelson Baulch (1870-1949). George and Clara lived their entire lives in Sumner County, Tennessee and had three sons: Nelson Howard Baulch (1902-1986), Ernest Franklin Baulch (1905-1976) and James Homer Baulch (1915-1992). There are many photos of their sons in this album; in most of these photos, Nelson was 18, Ernest was 14 and James Homer was 4.


Much of this photo album is a record of a family vacation from Tennessee to Texas. It is interesting to see what spots they chose to visit and photograph. Many of the buildings still exist today; some are even in finely restored condition! Unfortunately, the original of this photo album is not in such fine condition, so this digital version was made to preserve and share it for generations.

Most of the photos in this album are from a vacation taken by the Baulch and Horn families in 1920. They would have started at their home just north of Gallatin, Tennessee. Photo captions indicate that they traveled to Memphis, Tennessee, Elmo, Texas, Dallas, Texas, Fort Worth, Texas, Waco, Texas, Hearne, Texas, Bryan, Texas, Houston, Texas, Galveston, Texas, Woodville, Mississippi and back to Gallatin. This would have been a journey of about 2,000 miles over roads in far rougher conditions that what we would experience in the 21st century.










